Basic First Aid Supplies

- Thermometer (with string or clip)
 - Stethoscope
 - Disposable gloves (latex or nitrile)
 - Scissors
 - Hoof pick
 - Flashlight or headlamp

Wound Care Supplies

- Saline or wound wash
 - Antiseptic solution
 - Non-stick pads
 - Gauze rolls and pads
 - Vet wrap
 - Standing wraps
 - Duct tape
-

Emergency Equipment

- Halters and lead ropes (clearly labeled)
 - Emergency ID tags
 - Portable water buckets
 - Twitch (only if you know how to use it)

Medications

(Use only as directed by your veterinarian)

- Banamine (with written dosing instructions)
 - Electrolytes
 - Activated charcoal (if recommended by vet)
 - Eye ointment

Documentation

- Emergency contact list
 - Veterinarian and farrier contact information
 - Horse medical records
 - Insurance information (if applicable)
-

Storage & Maintenance

- Waterproof container with secure lid
- Clearly labeled and easy to access
- Check expiration dates regularly
- Replace used or expired items promptly
